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ADELAIDE RESOURCES HITS MORE COPPER AND GOLD AT ROVER 1 – NT.

Adelaide Resources Limited (**ASX code: ADN**) has announced further drill intersections at its Rover 1 Prospect, located 80 kilometres southwest of Tennant Creek in the Northern Territory.

The latest results include 11.4 metres at 2.63% copper and 1.42 grams per tonne gold. The intersection includes a high grade zone of 5.4 metres assaying 4.21% copper.

The drill intersection persists to the southern tenement boundary of Adelaide Resources' Exploration Licence. A co-operative agreement with neighbouring explorer Westgold Resources Limited allowed that company to extend the drillhole into its ground, delivering it a bonanza grade gold intersection of 6 metres at 78.7 grams per tonne gold and 1.0% copper.

Commenting on the results, Adelaide Resources' Managing Director Chris Drown, said "We have hit a body of mineralisation that straddles the shared tenement boundary between Adelaide Resources' and Westgold's licences."

"By combining the respective intersections from both Adelaide Resources' and Westgold's portions, we estimate what the full drill intersection is approximately 17 metres at 28 grams per tonne gold and 2% copper, which is a great result."

"We currently think that the trend of this new zone of copper and gold may see more of it present on Adelaide Resources' ground to the west of this intersection, while Westgold's share is likely to increase to the east."

Mr Drown concluded "The interpreted mineralisation trend raises the possibility that bonanza grade gold intervals may cross into Adelaide Resources' tenement west of this drill hole, so we plan to test this priority target early in the 2011 drilling program."

Adelaide Resources acquired the Rover Project in 2005 from an Australian subsidiary of Newmont Mining Corporation. The area is considered to be highly prospective for gold and copper deposits similar to those mined historically at Tennant Creek.
